THE PARISH LETTER

How fortunate—or should I say, blest—we are to have such good contributors to our church magazine, Four of them, Adrienne, Ken Downham, Fr John and Graham have set me thinking about change. The more I have thought about it the more confusing it becomes. Clearly it is inevitable and it affects us all in so many different ways. Some changes are good, some are bad and others we are not quite sure about. The world around us is changing all the time and there are also changes at a very personal level, involving ourselves, our families and friends.

What of course is so important in all this is how we react to changing circumstances. Fr John reflected not only on the changes in his life, but also on our situation at All Saints. It made me think about our responsibilities, not only about our involvement now, but also in the way we may respond to our next priest in charge. I felt very sorry for Asa when he came. It was always so hard to follow such an extremely good and popular priest like Stephen. It reminded me of someone following a much loved Rector in the parish where I was once a church warden. He found many people very set in their old ways and used to refer to his predecessor as Saint David! Our new priest will come with new ideas and new ways of doing things and we shall all have to think most carefully about the way in which we react to him or her.

In her letter, Adrienne referred to "fear of change". Sometimes that fear is justified. I thought about the terrible changes suffered by people in Ukraine, Somalia and Pakistan wrought about by war, famine and floods. There are also changes in this country that are coming about by inflation, rising energy costs and the possible reduction in the value of universal credit. All of which are leading to genuine poverty. Often homemade fear of change is unnecessary. We can get caught up in that sad way of thinking expressed in the hymn "Abide With Me" -"Change and decay in all around I see ..." We certainly used to see if it is just prejudice that governs our attitudes.

Ken Downham's article had a very powerful underlying message, that, through all the changing scenes of life, the most important factor is that our relationships with others. It is a sad fact that we often hear people say after someone close to them has died. *"I wish I had seen them more often and enjoyed the good times that I know we would have had together."* Perhaps when we think about the changes that occur in our relationships, it should help us to see just why there is such an emphasis on love in Jesus' teaching and in the letters in the New Testament such as those written by Paul and John. We should also remember that they call us to love those who don't love us. As someone once said, we are called as Christians to love everyone but that does not mean we have to like them all!

There is no doubt that when changes come they can leave us feeling confused or even afraid. Adrienne showed us how we might cope, by turning to Scripture. But how do we make use of the invaluable lessons there are there? Graham, I think, gave us the answer when he wrote of his spiritual and emotional pain. He wrote *"But you have to follow God's leading and along with self acceptance comes the call to new life"* He then quoted Philippians 3v13 for us to think about clearly as Christians, when facing any difficulties relating to change. We are called on to search for God's guidance through prayer and the Scriptures. Then most important of all to follow God's teaching wherever that might take us.

So, all in all, with regard to our services of worship, I think we have a lot to be




thankful for, and of course as time goes on, Jordan will be able to play an increasing role, which I am sure will be great

A reflection on my Ordination

Soon after moving in to the Vicarage, we bought an outdoor swing for the children to play with, after a few days of being nagged I eventually grabbed a ladder found a large tree and began to ascend. From ground level it didn't look to high at all, but having to continue to climb higher than the ladder would go, on reaching my destination I looked over and my perspective completely changed! Since my son was watching his hero (*Dad*) I couldn't back down now, so I took a deep breath, found a strong looking branch and lent against it as I began to secure the swing.

I had done it!

Then hoisting myself up so I could begin my descent, SNAP the branch that had so reliably held me all that time completely broke and I fell. I was certain I would crash to the ground but somehow in the chaos my hands managed to grab hold of a different branch which saved me from worse injury then a bloodied arm (which to my son looked rather awesome).

In many ways the lead up to my ordination had similarities, a call which began many years ago and would take some nagging from God until I began scaling the overwhelming process to this unique vocation. At times I have stopped and looked over the side questioning if I can do this, but with the support of many who have cheered me along the way I got to the Ordination Day.

The retreat a few days prior to the Ordination began with doubts around whether the ordination would even go ahead in light of the Queens death. It was a really valuable time though; the 48 hours of silence hugely facilitated a right mentality and this alongside the led reflections helped me consider what it meant to be called afresh to follow Christ. As the big day drew closer, I felt a real weightiness on me which Bishop Lusa very helpfully pointed out to me, was an interesting choice of word to describe my feelings because *Kavod* is the word which is commonly used in the Old Testament to describe what is the weight of God's glory. It certainly reminded me that this was always a call on my life, yet one which I must continually say yes to.

It was special to walk with my fellow Ordinands up to the Cathedral and doing so with Rev Julie by my side, and then to be greeted in the Cathedral by family and friends. During the service I felt a huge privilege as I stood up and was presented before all those present and watching afar to serve in the parishes of Heybridge St Andrews w St George's, Langford St Giles and Maldon All Saints w St Peter's. The sermon given by Bishop Lusa I pray will have a lasting effect on my ministry as I remember his word of caution that for us who are entering ministry in a time when the 'Church is gripped by existential anxiety' that the message we are entrusted with 'is not come to church because without YOU we will die, but come to church and YOU will live'.

At the declarations I was reminded again how weighty this call is, as the



Bishop asked us questions around what the call of a deacon involves. it is 'to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.' This as well as the many other promises which a deacon is meant to devote themselves to is beyond overbearing!

Yet what I clung on to most in the service, was that the required response is not yes, I will, but is 'with the **help of** God I will'.

It can be so easy to lean on things which we think are strong and will bear the weight of our lives, especially as I look at the challenges facing the Church today at the start of my own ministry, there is a real temptation to believe the answer is in a model or hard work or some attribute which I possess. This service coupled with falling out of a tree reminded me, there is no branch that we can truly trust and lean upon, only Jesus, and only through Him can we say—I will !

The poppies of Remembrance

In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed. leaving them bleak and barren, with seeminalv every living thing destroyed.



But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.


TEN TO TEN October 8th

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

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

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HOLY DAYS

Thinking of GUY FAWKES

"I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good and pleases God our Saviour" 1 Timothy 2:1-3

Guy Fawkes Night used to be much more popular than it is now, and many homes had bonfire parties and made 'Guys'. Until the 19th century the law even said that you had to go to church on that day for a special service, and no doubt the day ended with bonfires and celebration.

The Observance of 5th November Act 1605 was also known as the Thanksgiving Act, as it was a response to the deliverance from the Gunpowder Plot. It required church ministers to hold a special service of thanksgiving annually on $5^{\text{th-}}$ November, during which the act was to be read out loud in church. The act re-



quired that all "Ministers in every Cathedral and Parish Church... shall always upon the fifth Day of November have a service which all persons had to "diligently and faithfully" attend.

The introduction to the act described the "inhuman, barbarous and cruel" terrorist plot to murder the king and his government, which was prevented by the miraculous discovery just in time. The legislation said the country should always be thankful and have a "joyful day of deliverance".

The law was repealed on 25thMarch 1859 by the Anniversary Days Observance Act, when other special commemorative days dating from the Seventeenth Century were also being abolished. People probably wanted to move away from some of these commemorations which were anti-Roman Catholic.

Thankfully we live in a more tolerant era, but sadly, are we less grateful for our blessings? How often do we have thanksgiving services in church? Now, more than ever, we need to pray for our nation and show our gratitude for the many blessings God has given us and our nation.



The Good Service

On 11th of September the celebrant for our Sunday service was Father John who also gave the sermon. This was the first Sunday after the death of our much loved and respected Queen Elizabeth 2nd. Father John paid his personal respects for the life of Queen Elizabeth and then told us about one of his early memories of receiving a commemorative mug for the coronation in 1953 when he was just three years old and lived in Northamptonshire. John commented on the fact that like many more people our Queen was the only monarch he had ever known as he was too young to have memories of the Queen's father, King George Sixth, who was monarch from 1936 to 1952. Our service that day was about the Queen and how she had kept The Faith all her life and had also been a loyal servant to her people as she had promised to be at her coronation, never wavering in that duty for over seventy years. Two of the hymns that we sang at the service were two of the Queen's favourites, and they can be found in Hymns Ancient and Modern numbers 194 and 426.

The Queen was Universally respected, for example Germany paid a tribute by floodlighting the Brandenburg Gate which depicted a Union flag. President Macron of France paid his tribute by saying that "For Britons she was Your Queen. For the French she was The Queen". Such respects and tributes were paid all over the world, and of course, we all witnessed the huge crowds and the outpouring of love and respect shown in Britain.

I once met the Queen, when my Company won a Queen's award to Industry for Export services, and I and my business partner along with Margaret Lyle an All Saints worshipper and our accountant had the great pleasure and honour of being presented to the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh in 1999 at Buckingham Palace. Joan and I have also met King Charles 3rd when I was a trustee director of the Shell pension fund. The fund had invested in a new shopping mall in the city of Lincoln and the then Prince Charles opened the new mall and we were privileged to have a short conversation with the Prince.

As a tribute to our new King, Charles 3rd, we sang 'God Save the King' to finish the service.

I have titled this short piece "The Good Service". The service conducted by father John was indeed a good one, but perhaps I was thinking also about what Queen Elizabeth 2nd had given to our nation. Good Service indeed.
